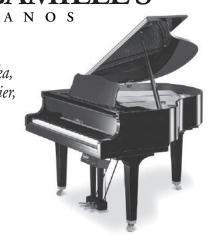
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Spotlight On... Marcia Madeira, Lighting Designer

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"Lighting tells you where to look on stage, the mood, the time of day, and illuminates or hides," explained Marcia Madeira, who has designed four Broadway shows, and was Tony-nominated and a Drama Desk Award winner for the original Nine. "It enhances everything, makes everything look beautiful, and helps tell the story." To accomplish this Madeira works in collaboration with the director, set designer, costumer, choreographer and actors. The master electrician on the project first sends her a current inventory of lighting instruments, and she reads the script to see what effects are written in, such as lightning, night scenes, water, etc. "The first thing is to get the ground plan, see sketches, get swatches, then talk to the director to see where there

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are special moments for lighting," said Madeira. She has small lights in her studio, and can shine them with color filters on swatches of fabric or paint to see how she can best create the effect the director, scenic designer, and costumer desire. "Once I tested a green fabric for William Ivey Long that was absolutely dead under lights, no colors would work. He came to my studio and I shone my little inkies on it to show him. He went back to his studio, threw out a bolt of fabric, and won the Tony!" she laughed.

Madeira then drafts a lighting plot, which is an overhead view of the stage with the lights drawn in, following the scene designer's plans. "Because it is so intangible, it requires tons of paperwork," she explained. Each light is indicated by a graphic symbol representing the type of lighting instrument and the accompanying paperwork shows which circuit and dimmer it is plugged into and which channel on the computer will control it. "Basically, lighting is making pictures.

I make a list of what I need to create, such as daytime, storminess, is it a night-club, or is it a front porch," Madeira said, "In My Way, the nightclub is supposed to be at the top of a skyscraper, so the light will come up from outside the windows to make you feel you are up high."

Once the design is on paper, Madeira, who has designed more than 15 shows for Gateway Playhouse, including My Way, attends rehearsals to learn the show. Then the scenery goes up, and the master electrician and his crew hang the lights on pipes according to the lighting

plot. Every instrument hung in the air has four separate numbers to identify it, instrument number, circuit number, dimmer number and control channel. Madeira then comes in to work with the electricians on focusing the lights, which can take up to 10 hours. "I stand on the stage where I want the light to hit and direct the technicians to point the light and what adjustments to make - should it be hard or soft edge, should a shutter cut edges off scenery? I try to design with circles of light so that I can get as much coverage out of that light as possible. Even when you have a ton, there are never enough lights!" Madeira said, "Although ultimately it becomes not worth it to have too many. You don't have time to program them all and take care of them during the run. Put up only as many as you need with a few spare."

Whenever the look of the stage is changed, it is called a "cue." During the run of a show, the Stage Manager calls the cues, and a lighting technician pushes the go button on the computer. Lighting has come a long way from the days when technicians had to use both arms and legs to manually change the lights. "I consider myself lucky enough to have worked with every different kind of control system that ever was....except gaslight! boards, which were resistance boards with resistance plates, auto-transformers, pre-set boards, and almost all the different computers as they have come out," said Madeira. At the first tech rehearsal, the electricians try to set as many basic cues as they can. At Gateway, the Monday before opening is spent focusing, Monday night and Tuesday afternoon are for setting cues, Tuesday night there is a dress rehearsal with a production meeting following. Madeira and crew stay late programming until nearly everything is in the computer. She takes a lot of notes during the first performance on Wednesday, and usually stays for a day or two to clean up and finesse the design. "Although the production process is short and fast, the people I work with here at Gateway are wonderful and the product we make is high quality," Madeira said, "You become part of the Gateway family and I always hope I can design here every season!"

Madeira grew up in a theatrical family, her father taught English and did technical theatre at U. Mass. and her mother directed shows at U. Mass and acted at Amherst College. Madeira began her own career at Amherst painting scenery, progressed to running a follow-spot, and eventually began to design lights for summer stock. She has lit Ice Capades, and been lighting shows on cruise ships since 1984, most recently the ice shows on Royal Caribbean, which has allowed her to travel Europe widely. Although she could paint and had lessons in ballet and piano, lighting remains her love. "Lighting is like orchestrating," Madeira declared, "Like music, it only happens in time. It has texture, rhythm, speed, color. It is magic. It is endlessly fascinating."☆



THE GATEWAY WINDMILL

One of the most recognizable features of the Gateway property is the wisteria-covered wooden windmill that stands next to the office building. The exact origins of the structure are lost to time; it was probably built between 1868 when the house that is now the office was built, and 1884 when the Mott family acquired the former Osborne estate. The brick building attached to it was built first and the windmill went up around it.



Gateway's founder, Harry Pomeran, along with his wife Libby and their children, Sally, David and Ruth, bought the property in the early 1940's and began operating it as a hotel. "We never called it a windmill, it was always 'the pump house', because under the stairs there is a huge artesian well," executive producer Ruth Allan remembers, "It pumped all the property's water and it was known as the best water in Bellport."

The family made the hotel as self-sufficient as possible, raising chickens, and growing fruit and vegetables. The Pump House became something of a fruit cellar, where Libby stored all her canned goods. "During the 1940's we had 200 chickens, and because we didn't have hotel guests in the winter, Mom preserved the eggs in brine. She also made jelly, and pickled pears from the pear tree. For us, the pump house was also my Dad's toolshed," said Ruth. The local wildlife found uses for the building as well - a family of white owls took up residence in the top of the tower.

On September 15, 1944, the Great Atlantic Hurricane made land for a second time on the East Coast, slamming into Long Island with 85 mph winds. The windmill's wheel fins were the only casualties of the storm on the Gateway property. "They were found as far away as Head of the Neck Road," said Ruth, "That night we stayed up praying and

not one of those fins came down on anyone's house." Harry Pomeran had installed an electric pump by then, so the fins were not replaced. Harry also reinforced the interior corners of the tower with steel. The building became a landmark, being the tallest structure around, it could be seen coming in from Bellport Bay. "It would be easy just to take it down, but it would be very hard not to have it. That, the barn, and the old wing of the house, that's Gateway. It's important to preserve it because of its antiquity," declared Ruth.

Over the years, age and weather took their toll on the windmill. The top of the structure had been steadily leaning at the rate of 2-3 degrees a year, but by this past autumn, the pitch had worsened to where the Allan family began to worry that a bad nor'easter would blow it off. The Bellport Fire Dept was called in to lend the services of their snorkel truck to temporarily shore up the building. Two weeks later a crane was hired to remove the top, and the family decided to begin restoration.

Architects Keith DeLucia from J&B Designs and Jack Rosebery from Rosebery Architectural Studio, Medford firms specializing in historic buildings, have created a design that will bring the windmill back to its 1940 look including the roof, picket fence around the top, wheel and fins. Paul plans for the restored windmill to be functional, "It should generate enough electricity to power itself, its lighting, etc," he said. Gateway Playhouse will offset the restoration costs with a special event, "The Summer Wind" a concert that will feature songs and singers from Gateway's best-loved productions.

What everyone associates most with the windmill is the wisteria that grows over it, probably planted in the 1880's. Every year, the Allans, the Gateway staff, and patrons eagerly look forward to its blooming. "We've had to cut it back several times because it gets so heavy," said Ruth, "but it always comes back". As will the windmill &

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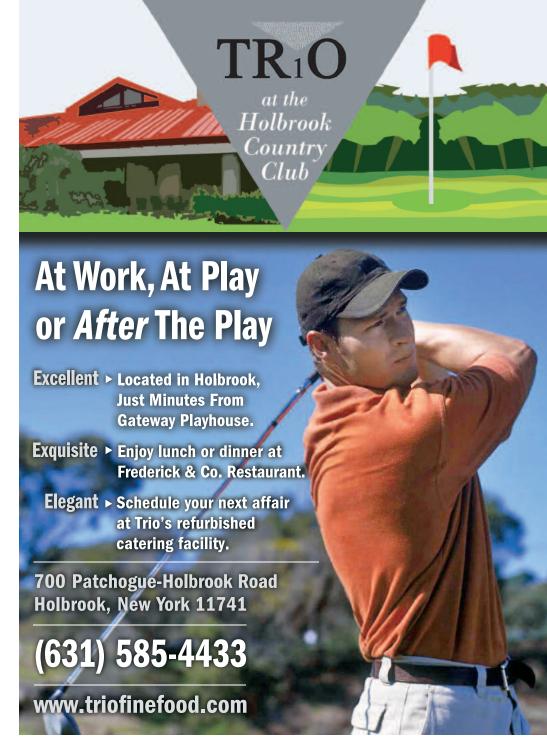
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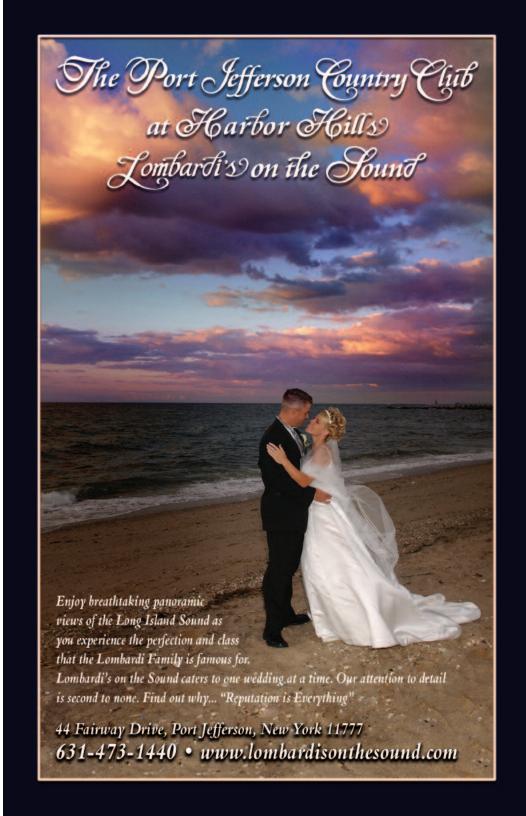


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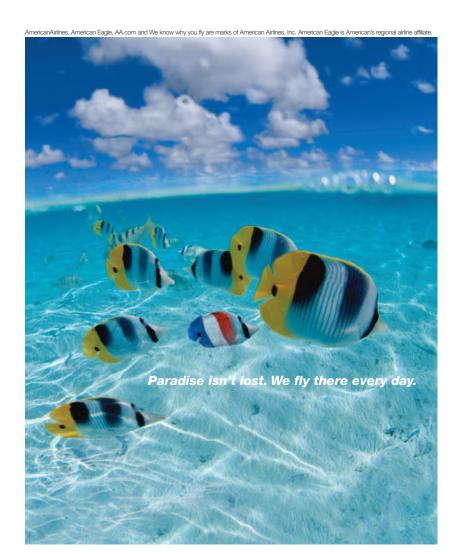
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
