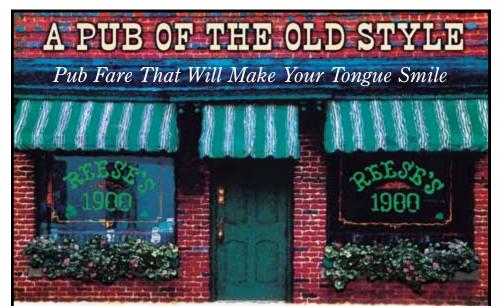

CHATTING WITH CHET

An Interview with the Director and Choreographer of Smokey Joe's Café

66 They say the neon lights are bright on Broadway. They say there's always magic in the air." The music and lyrics of Jerry Leiber and Mike Stoller echo in my mind as I watch some of the rehearsals for Smokey Joe's Café. And indeed, there is magic in the air, crackling and sparkling as each performer takes the stage to sing and dance in a revue show that I can only describe as something truly spectacular. But the magic is also due, in part, to Chet Walker, the multiaward winning director and choreographer who has garnered critical acclaim around the world. I sat down with glitter in my eyes and the magic still enveloping me to talk with Mr. Walker about Smokey Joe's Café, directing, theatre, and life.

ME: *Pippin* has a lot of circus themes in the show, and your concept for *Smokey Joe's Café* is a la American Idol. How do you come up with and create a concept for a particular show?

CW: The original concepts are always out there, and then for me, I always have to go back to why someone wanted to do the show in the first place. There's never a show that starts and ends exactly the way the creators created it because, you know, people change, they can't find the right casting, venues, money, or whatever. Sometimes what we worked out on paper doesn't look good on stage, so that always changes things. With *Smokey Joe's Café*, specifically, it's a catalogue of songs by two really amazing men. So what do you do with something like that? You celebrate it. And what better way to do that in the theatre than as an awards show, or a television show.

ME: When you're directing and choreographing, especially for a show like this, where there really isn't a plot or through line, how do you help the actor to find their character and create their journey?

CW: When you look at the songs of Leiber and Stoller, they're about people. When you look at the songs, and see the people who sing them, you can begin to see



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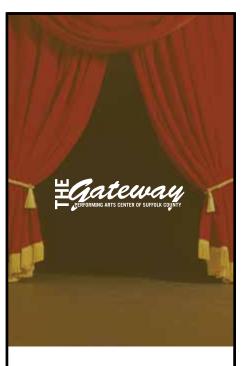
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that this group of songs, they have this personality or that personality. And these songs, they communicate certain feelings. I look at these songs as being very powerful and very positive. And when you have the actors that we have, they can relate to certain aspects/attributes of these songs, and that's when they start to find their journey. All of a sudden that actor who's singing that particular song, it becomes very personal to them. They're not trying to imitate someone who has sung the song/done the role before, but they're finding their own niche, and the actor and the song intertwine. They say in musical theatre that when you can't talk about something anymore, you sing about it. And that's where we are now. We're at the sing about it stage. The song talks to you and relates to you as a person.

ME: So when the actors are finding that character and making those connections, how do you direct them in a way that doesn't hinder or hurt that organic-ness and those personal feelings?

CW: Most people come in with a preconceived idea of what it's supposed to be or how it's supposed to sound, what with youtube, soundtracks, and all that. But I look at it as, no, that's the way that someone else did it. You may do a really great copy of someone else, but that's certainly not you. And that's my job. My job is to push you to a place where your understanding of it far exceeds anything that you've ever heard or seen before and then being able to communicate that in what you say, what you dance, and what you sing. You understand that the audience understands what you understand. They don't have to understand it, they have to understand you. When you do the show for, what is it, like 25 performances, there should be those 25 different conversations, and then multiply that by how many songs there

are. I think like 42. So that's different each time. I'm not saving change it, but have that conversation and really feel it that many times. (The audience) is right there with the actor in that moment. And these sonas are set up that way. (As an audience), they can make you think. They can make you feel. They can break vour heart.

ME: In my research of your career, I noticed that you have done a lot of revivals. How do you direct and choreograph these classic shows and make them unique and your own?

CW: That's funny, because, you know, I don't want to make them my own. I come from a





different generation, and I believe that the actual written word, whether it is lyrics, or the actual dialogue, are the most important. I believe that as a director, I need to take what is on the page and put in on the stage. And then once it is on stage, I need to make sure that what was written on the page makes sense. Because if you have to explain it to audience members, you're done, forget it. You've failed as a director. You also have to have the knowledge of why someone created it in the first place. What was the writer or director trying to say then? I want to preserve what was there and show why it worked then, and when I direct/choreograph, I make it so that the audience understands what it was and is about and how it fits into the culture and the world of today.

ME: You began your career onstage at the age of 16. At Gateway, we have an acting school for kids who range in age from 5 to 18, and we also produce several children's theatre shows each season. What advice would you give to these kids about future careers in the theatre industry?

CW: Be open to everything, and have real passion. There's a difference between real passion for theatre and fake passion. The fake passion is having your parents want you to want to do it, or thinking that you're going to be the next big star. These reality shows like American Idol or So You Think You Can Dance gren't about real passion. They're about making it and being the next big thing. You have to think about it as a profession, not a gig. Just think about how many of those American Idol and So You Think You Can Dance winners have careers today. After the first album, there's not really much after that. You have to create and shape your own career. That's where parents and teachers come in. Help them to see their potential and all the possibilities. Also, I'd say that you have to know the history of it. The history is so important. Know why you want to do it and those people that did it before you. Everything is glways evolving, and in this business, no one can stay in a cocoon. And another thing: everyone says you have to get used to rejection. I don't think of it as rejection. It should be thought of as why should you do something that you're not right for? Move on to the next thing, whatever that may be.

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GATEWAY PLAYHOUSE

THE COASTERS The Musical Sensation that Swept the Nation

"BOOM!" That is the word historians use when describing the 1950's in America. Everything was booming, from the number of babies reaching its peak, to the rapidly growing economy. Changes could be seen at every turn. The Supreme Court declared that separate educational facilities for colored children was "inherently unequal" in the landmark trial of Brown vs. Board of Education, and Rosa Parks refused to give up her seat on the bus, fanning the flames of the Civil Rights Movement. The cold war was looming on the horizon as tensions grew between Soviet Russia and the United States. The Space Race had been mounted and the Red Scare had spread its terror across the country. Yet another change had been occurring, this one in the music industry. The soft velvety crooning of Frank Sinatra, Judy Garland, and Bing Crosby had been replaced with the up-tempo wail of the guitar and fast paced vocals of Buddy Holly, Brenda Lee, and Elvis Presley. Out of this new era of music, now called Rock and Roll, arose another style of music one that has survived the test of time and can still be heard today.

One of the front-runners of this style of music is a group known as *The Coasters*. *The Coasters* began their career in 1955. The original members were the musical talents of Carl Gardner, Bobby Nunn, Billy Guy and Leon Hughes. Prior to the formation of *The Coasters*, Carl Gardner and Bobby Nunn sang with a rhythm and blues group called *The Robins*, which was a group based out of Los Angeles, California. At the time Jerry Leiber and Mike Stoller had begun Spark records and had produced "Smokey Joe's Cafe" with *The Robins*. Due to the popularity of the record, it came to the attention of Atlantic Records who offered the team an independent production contract. In1957 Bobby Nunn and Leon Hughes were replaced with Will Jones and Cornell Gunter, thus sparking the beginning of the legacy of *The Coasters*.

The partnership between The Coasters and Leiber and Stoller was an instant success. Such hits as "Down in Mexico", "Searchin", "Young Blood", "Yakety Yak", and "Charlie Brown" topped the charts and launched *The Coasters*. into infamy. They quickly became known as "The Clown Princes of Rock and Roll" due to the humorous storytelling nature of their songs.

Carl Gardner always owned the legal right to *The Coasters*. name and it was passed down to his widow Veta Gardner after his death in 2011.The current group members are, Joe Lance Williams, Primotivo Candelaria, Eddie Whitefield, all personally handpicked by Carl Gardner before his passing. Dennis Anderson joined the group after his death.

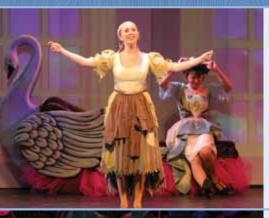
The Coasters. were the very first group inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in 1987, and with good reason. They were a huge influence on several rock and roll groups in the 60's and 70's including *The Beatles, The Grateful Dead, The Monkeys, Leon Russell,* and *Elvis Presley* who rerecorded several of *The Coasters*' songs and helped to keep their hits alive and well. Members inducted included Carl Gardner, Billy Guy, Will Jones and Cornell Gunter.

These are the hits you will see and hear today, the songs that you remember listening to on the radio and the records that you put on the turntable. Close your eyes and listen to the harmonies and melodies of the past and let them stir in you the memories of decades long ago, but never forgotten.

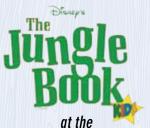






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
